#### Dear friends in Christ,

Finding Light and Warmth This Autumn.

Autumn has a way of speaking to us. The days shorten, evenings draw in, and there's a new chill in the air. We notice the glow of lamps through windows as we walk home, and there's comfort in the thought of a warm house, a hot cuppa, and the company of those we love. Light and warmth matter more when the dark and cold creep closer.



Here in Barnsley, we know better than most the importance of warmth and shelter. For generations, coal was the lifeblood of this town. This autumn invites us to do just that. To light a candle, to share a meal, to be present with those who matter. To rest in God's sheltering love and tend to our own mental wellbeing. To remember that God does not measure us by our rushing, but by our love.

And so, as the leaves fall and nights draw near, may we gather again around the fire—whether in our homes, our families, or our faith—and find in Christ the light and warmth that will never go out.



#### Gerrard Sinfonia to play Darton Church as part of their Sunday@4 series



Gerrard Sinfonia is a string orchestra of 24 players with a conductor, Barbara Bancroft, founded in around 2008 by Roy Gerrard. Roy was a peripatetic violin teacher who also had private students, including a few adults. As there was no Barnsley string orchestra the adults could join, Roy, along with friend and colleague Paul Bryant, created one.

Hope House Church, Barnsley, served as the original rehearsal space, with the group initially playing for enjoyment rather than performance. In more recent years it has gone from strength to strength and the group now gives 3 concerts per year. Venues include Penistone, Cawthorne Church, Darton Church and Upper

Denby Church.
Gerrard Sinfonia is part of the
Hoylandswaine Arts Group but is
run autonomously. Players come
from Barnsley, Huddersfield, and
West of Huddersfield and the
group is always pleased to
welcome new players.

Repertoire includes classical music e.g. Bach's double violin concerto, and lighter music e.g. Libertango. After the last concert in March, a member of the audience wrote in to say how the orchestra had gone from strength to strength, and how impressed he was with the standard.

The group is very much looking forward to returning to Darton Church for their next concert on Sunday 12th October at 4-00pm. The first half includes some serious music by composers Corelli, Boyce and Bach. The second half has some fascinating unknowns yet to be finalised. Please come and support us.

#### **Reflecting Faith: Coloured Window Glass**



Why do we have so much coloured glass of all shapes and sizes in church buildings?

Stained glass in churches is similar to wall paintings. It adds colour as well as traditionally teaching non literate people about the great events and characters of their religion.

But glass is so much more than that.

The techniques used to create these windows have been refined over the centuries, and their intricate beauty has inspired countless artists and designers.

The way the light shines through the glass creates a unique atmosphere that is often described as ethereal or heavenly. In this way, the use of stained-glass windows helps to

create a sacred space that is set apart from the secular world.

The light shining through the glass throws the colours onto the adjacent brickwork or stonework. Depending on the original colours, the intensity of the light, the angle of the sun's rays, as well as the height and angle away from the watcher, these colours can range from vibrantly strong to softly muted.

Hundreds of years ago people saw the changes in light in this way as being very significant. It was thought that the light passing through was transformed or transmuted and therefore had a healing and revivifying effect on people who placed themselves within its light.

When you visit a church on a sunny day, just enjoy the play of light being put on for you. What does it say about God's love for you?

#### Share a little light

Some parents aren't sure quite what to feel about Hallowe'en—is it just harmless fun, or are there aspects of it that don't fit in with how we want to see the world? The christening service is very honest about the reality of good and evil and Hallowe'en can be a good time to talk about those things and how the love of Jesus can be a light in the darkness for everyone.



The word "Hallowe'en" actually means "the eve of all hallows' day" – in other words, the night before the church's festival celebrating All Saints. A Saint is sometimes thought to be an exceptionally holy person – someone really special, who did extraordinary things because of their faith in God.

The famous saints are all amazing examples of what it's like to live God's way. But in the Bible, St Paul calls all Christians, saints – a saint is simply a friend of God, who seeks to live their life according to God's purposes. When someone is christened, they truly become a Saint, so All Saints' day is a celebration of the whole family of God.

If you'd like to mark Hallowe'en, these are some ideas that will bless others as well as being fun too.

#### What's happening in church?

Some churches hold special events around this time of year. Some churches also have a special service for All Souls day - a time when we remember our loved ones who have died. There might be an opportunity to go and light a candle to remember someone - even small children grieve in their own way, and may find comfort in this simple action. All Saints will take place at both churches in the morning services on November 2nd and there will be a memorial service on the same day for All Souls at 3.30 pm at St John's and 5 pm at All Saints

#### Carve a pumpkin

Did you know that gargoyles (the scary looking faces carved in stone on churches) were originally made in medieval times to scare away evil spirits? The pumpkins with scary faces carved into them at Hallowe'en are a bit like that. But nowadays most people believe that you can't fight evil with evil - you can only fight evil by doing good, and that good will always win in the end. So why not see if you can carve a friendly looking pumpkin this Hallowe'en, as a sign that you and your family are going to be a force for good this Hallowe'en? (And you can always use the offcuts from your pumpkin to make delicious soup!)

Say a goodnight prayer

Even if you've steered clear of scary costumes, and even if your child has loved the evening, it can be reassuring to have a goodnight prayer that reminds them that love, and light, and good, are always going to be stronger than fear and evil. The ancient service of Compline (Night Prayer) has been used as this reminder for centuries, and many of its prayers are still well known today:

Visit this place, O Lord, we pray and drive far from it all snares of the enemy; let your holy angels dwell with us to preserve us in peace; and let your blessing be upon us always through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. Or, in a simpler children's version: Be with us, Lord, and take away all fear, may your angels protect us and give us peace. And bless us always. AMEN



#### REMEMBER THE COAL




Talk to anyone who was there and you will learn that you missed a real treat. The narrated history of mining coal was delivered by John Snook and supplemented by recordings of the thoughts of former miners (spoken by actors), children, women and men, all supported by guitar playing and vocals from Alan Wood. Various pit disasters were mentioned and the Aberfan disaster related via the notes of a police officer who witnessed the event. The performance was interesting historically, educational and emotional. Do you know the difference between a mining accident and a disaster? There was a disaster only when 10 or more people were killed.

Working with the History Group of Friends of Mapplewell and Staincross, Bob Hawes arranged the performance to be on the 90th anniversary of the North Gawber (Lidgett) Colliery disaster of 12th September 1935. His work on the background of the 19 men who lost their lives was made available along with photographs provided by descendants of the men's families. This United Benefice holds the graves of ten of the deceased men, three at Staincross and seven at Darton.

We are grateful for the assistance given by Jill Clapham, librarian at the National Coal Mining Museum for England; by Steve Wyatt for clarification of mining vocabulary; and by Chris Skidmore, Yorkshire Area Chairman, N.U.M. who provided a copy of the Report into the disaster, a map of the pit showing where the deceased men were found and other documents. We express special thanks to Chris for arranging for the North Gawber banner to be on stage as the background to the performance.
