#### Fr Tim writes ....

And then it was November. I was told by somebody recently that one of the signs of getting older is that time begins to go by faster. Well in that case, I have clearly reached a milestone, and simply can't believe that I'm writing this article surrounded by emails confirming orders of poppy wreaths, holding details of buglers, and debating the best dates to hold Carol Services given the unfortunate face that Christmas Day is on a Monday this year.



You'd think that by now I would be used to the increase in workload in the last three months of the year. When I worked in retail, these three months were known as the "Golden Quarter", on the basis that as a result of Halloween, Bonfire Night, Advent Calendars and Christmas, we could expect to take as much money in three months as we had in the previous nine.

Of course the reality is that anyone who worked in a supermarket felt this only too keenly, with the pressure of keeping products on shelves, keeping queues short, and providing service to customers which was as they would (or should) expect.

But did any one of us actually think that these three months were "golden"? In reality, probably not. They were exhausting. They took months of careful planning, and before we knew it of course, they were over and the Cadburys Crème Eggs were on the shelves.

Well, there are certainly times when it feels as though nothing has changed. But then I'm reminded that everything has changed. It's true, it would be very easy to fall into the "Golden Quarter" trap. We are faced with weeks now of the great countdown towards Christmas. As we enter November, there are less than sixty days to go.

But before we get to Christmas, we have November to travel through. November is a month of extremes. It begins with All Saints' Day, a great celebration of all the Saints, all those who have been recognised as serving their God with commitment, with courage, and with confidence, and of course there are so many others who will never be recognised. Then of course there is All Souls' Day, when we remember and pray for the souls of the faithful departed, and place our confidence and trust in the mercy of God.

Within a week, we then meet Remembrance Sunday head on, and recall the sacrifice paid by so many, as indeed this year we consider so many parts of our world where this sacrifice is still made day by day. And before the end of the month we celebrate the great feast of Christ the King. We recognise again the Kingship of Jesus Christ, the fact that even through the pain and

the hardship of our world, Jesus is Lord and King, and lives to continually pray to God the Father for us.

And then, and only then, we can join in with the rest of our community, open our Advent Calendars, put our trees up, and get excited about Christmas. But, as I think about all of these events, it strikes me very powerfully that when we get to Christmas, we celebrate the birth of this very same King, we know that through the stories of oxen, asses, stables and bizarre gifts, we do far more than simply welcome a baby into the world, and unless we begin the story recognising that from the very outset, this is the Son of God, Christ the King, we will never take the Christmas story seriously enough.

But, we live among so many who will never make these links, who will never celebrate Christ the King, who won't give a thought to the Saints of God, and what it means to be called by God. Unless that is, we help them to know. The world is travelling its "Golden Quarter". And so is the Church. The Golden Quarter of the retailers, the supermarkets, is open to absolutely everyone who can afford it, to spend all they have and enjoy the rewards. How are we any different, and what are we prepared to do to share the challenging month of November with those who we will welcome in December?



# VISIT BY GAWBER HISTORY GROUP (25TH AUGUST 2023)

The Gawber History Group joined the Darton Heritage Group in church on 25th August for a working lunch. The purpose of the visit was to explore the ancestral history of the Gawber Parish within the old Darton Ecclesiastical Parish Boundary which included Darton. Kexbrough, Barugh, Gawber, Mapplewell and Staincross. Gawber became a separate parish in 1848 and Mapplewell and Staincross became independent in 1930.)

An excellent lunch was provided by Sue, Bridget and Janet!

The tour of the church began at the west end of the nave where the immediate focus was on the base of the Norman font which had been donated to St Thomas' Church, Gawber in 1877. The photocopy below is taken from the Baptism Records at St Thomas' Church. The writing on the entry is faint but reads:

November the 30th 1877

The old font which used to stand in the Mother Church at Darton was this day brought to Gawber having been given to the Daughter Church by the following: The Rev Charles Sangster. Vicar of Darton

Not long after 1877, the parish of the new St Thomas' Church raised sufficient funds to buy their own font, and 'our' Norman font was placed in the churchyard from where was stolen.

The highlight of the tour for the Gawber History Group was in the northern area of the chancel where two brass inscriptions are to be found on what appears to be a family vault. Both families in the brass plaques lived in Gawber Hall, as identified in the inscriptions.

#### RAPHE JENKINSON

`Here lieth buried the bodie of Raphe Jenkinson / late of Gawber Hall, who departed this life ye 11th June / A Dm 1590 / Also ye fifth year of the rayne of our sovereigne Lady Quene Elizabeth and benefactor of the poor / of this ..../ I know that my redeemer liveth and he shall stand at the latter day on ye east / and though after my skin ye worms destroy / this body yet shall see him in my flesh."

Gawber Hall was given to John and Raffe Jenkinson and to Raffe's heirs after a dispute lasting approximately 32 years as a result of Gawber being added to Dodworth by the marriage of Agnes de Galbergh to John de Dodworth. The name of Jenkinson ended in two daughters, both coheiresses. One marrying Thomas Cutler of Fieldhead, and the other to Barber of Mare Bottom in Derbyshire. (Taken from 'History of Gawber' by W Bretton in Barnsley Reference Section.)

#### JOHN AND SUZANNA BARBER

'Here lieth the bodies of John Barber, late of Gawber Hall, / gent, and Suzanna his wife. / M John Barber was buried November ve 10th 1695 Aetat 67. / M Suzanna Barber was buried November ve 9th 1708 Aetat 67 / Blessed are they which die in the lord.'

The Barber family resided at Gawber Hall for nearly 200 years. By pure coincidence, Hugh Polehampton, a member of the Gawber History Group, is a direct descendant of the last owners of Gawber Hall, and he was extremely enthusiastic about the plagues. He was so enthusiastic that he was nearly locked in at the end of the meeting, - he was so busy taking photographs! (The `Barber plaque' has now come adrift from the vault and requires a little tlc. The piano used to be berthed in that northern part of the chancel, and after being manoeuvred around from time to time, the piano casters damaged the rivets on the plague, which is now free of the memorial. Hugh was delighted to hold it in his hands and to read the inscription. He would have been more than happy to take it back to Manchester!)

At the end of the tour all our visitors were given copies of the brass memorial inscriptions to take back to Gawber. The meeting was quite eventful in lots of ways, because towards the end of the session when the planned visit to Monk Bretton Priory was discussed, another friend from Gawber explained that he was an official guide to the priory and would be very willing to give the Darton Heritage Group a guided tour!

True to his word, on 26th September, Fredrick Thompson arrived at Monk





Bretton Priory in his Cluniac habit dressed as a Black Monk and gave our society an excellent guided tour. His involvement was so much appreciated that Janet Ryan, a member of the Darton Heritage Group, has been very busy making Fred a `period' accessory to add to his Black Cluniac outfit which is to be presented to him at the next meeting of the Gawber History Group.

War is a terrible thing, whether it was 100, 500, 900 years ago or is happening today. November, starting with All Saints and All Souls on 1st and 2nd, is the month when thoughts worldwide turn to those lost not just in war but through natural means as well. Our programme on ....

# Sunday@4 12 November in Darton Church

seeks to capture the thoughts of poets and musicians during their time of combat in 1914-18. Wilfred Owen, Robert Graves, Siegfried Sassoon, Rupert Brooke are probably the best known of the poets from that conflict, known collectively as 'the war poets' and some of their words will be represented in the readings by Lizzie Jones.

But not all the words and music written during 'the war to end all wars' are about the conflict. Lesser known poets such as Francis Ledwidge and Ivor Gurney, who wrote words and music, speak more of beauty in their memories of home - 'A Blackbird Singing' (Head) and 'Severn Meadows (Gurney).

We are also including songs from an earlier time and also later in the century: 'Autumn Evening' by Quilter; 'Song of Autumn' by Elgar and the end of the Requiem by Fauré

The second half of our programme is in a lighter vein and features popular songs of the time: We'll Gather Lilacs; Roses of Picardy and ending with a tribute to the nightingale from over the hill in Rochdale, Gracie Fields.

# Welcome to Eco Church

Shorter days are ahead when the clocks alter; many people find the loner periods of darkness lonely and depressing so please keep them in mind!

what uses them: look out for animal (and bird) footprints, it's amazing the unexpected places ou find deer slots.

Watch out for the spectacular sight of migratoy geese flying South for the winter in v-formations: ther evocative calling is a true sound of Autumn.

Bonfire night is close, but if you are having a bofire please inspect it carefully before lighting for slepy hedgehogs – and please have a thought for the arge

number of animals – and people – who are terrified by the noise of firevorks.

Remember our feathered friends: increased bird feeding in gardens during the months ahead helps out resident and visiting birds to survive.

Even butterflies need winter shelter: there are things that can be done to help prepare Wild Spaces for winter. These include leaving dead stems uncut to provide shelter for eggs, caterpillars and chrysalises. A simple pile of leaves or sticks can also offer protection against the cold weather to come for many species.



# Take a walk on the wild side!

We may like our gardens to look neat, but a recent survey by BBC's Gardener's Worldnagazine has found that more than half (54 per cent) of gardeners now include 'uncultivated areas'n their garden. And some 44 per cent of gardeners have also set up a wildflower area.

Certainly, nature could use a helping hand. In 2019 32% of us saw butterflies nour garden. By 2021, that was down to just 16%.

# Simple tips to rewild your garden:

- Avoid chemical pesticides and herbicides, which also kill good bugs', butteflies and bees.
- Tolerate as much mess as you can. Leave wood and leaf piles for hedgehog and invertebrates.
- Set aside some room where grass can grow longer, and wildflowers can blom. Don't pull up all your weeds they can be an important source of pollent for bees.

# Time to welcome your slugs and snails...

The Royal Horticultural Society says we should welcome slugs and snails, as they play a key role in garden ecosystems. Apparently, only nine of the 44 known species in the UK are likely to threaten our gardens, and all of them ply a vital role in recycling dead plant material and animal waste, and acting as a food source for hedgehogs, frogs, birds, beetles and flies.

Parkin... what else for bonfire night?



Ingredients

200g butter, plus extra for greasing

1 large egg 4 tbsp milk

200g golden syrup

85g treacle

85g light soft brown sugar 100g medium oatmeal

250g self-raising flour

1 tbsp ground ginger

# Method

Heat the oven to 160C/140C fan/gas 3.

Grease a deep 22cm square caké tin and line with

baking parchment.

Beat the egg and milk together with a fork.

Gently melt the syrup, treacle, sugar and butter together in a large pan until the sugar has dissolved.

Remove from the heat.

Mix the oatmeal, flour and ginger together and stir into the syrup mixture, followed by the egg and milk.

Pour the mixture into the tin and bake for 50 mins – 1 hr until the cake feels firm and a little crusty on top. Cool in the tin then wrap in more parchment and foil. Keep for up to five days before eating if you can – it'll become softer and stickier the longer you leave it, up to two weeks.

often make an Advent wreath – a circle of four candles in a ppropriate colours set in winter greenery with a central white or even gold candle to soon celebrate Christmas itself. We can also make a Christingle, an ancient custom from the Moravian church in central Europe, which tells the Christmas story in their traditional way, looking at Christ as the centre of our world, using symbolism which relates to children. Advent is certainly a time of preparation in all our churches

with special services and devotions.

This can also mean times of fasting or giving to heighten our preparation. There are four dedicated "Advent" Sundays before Christmas – Advent itself ends on Christmas Eve. As well as all of this, the beginning of Advent is always the start of a new liturgical year (this year 2023-24) which leads us through Epiphany, Easter and Pentecost, each festival with its own distinct celebrations. There is a liturgical cycle of three years (A-C) for every year in Advent- we celebrate the Evangelists Matthew Mark and Luke in each of the three years, with John having an overall role.

Advent is not a sort of mini Lent – it is not the same: we can look in "joyful hope" to the coming of Christ at Christmas and his second coming at the end of time. Initially there are changes in Church: the green coverings and vesture which have been used for a the "Ordinary" times of the year on the altar and liturgical furnishings, give way to violet or purple – in some places, this is more a blue. The atmosphere becomes more one of anticipation, although this traditionally lightens on the third Sunday of Advent when we have a

Sunday – "Rejoice" or "Gaudete" Sunday" which marks the centre of our time of preparation.

Music certainly has a place in Advent – special hymns, include some traditional and popular ones, including the evocative "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" which sets to music some well-known verses taken from Advent, psalms and prayers. Many churches have a "Festival of nine lessons and carols" in Advent, although it is not a general tradition to otherwise sing Christmas carols at this time. We save them for Christmas! Some parts of the Mass or Eucharist are omitted or "saved up" for our later celebrations-such as the Gloria hymn – the angels' song at the birth of Jesus. Many people keep an Advent calendar to mark these days, often including an appropriate scripture verse. Other versions of an Advent calendar have crept in over the years and these can include places for chocolate or alcohol within the calendar. These are not really appropriate for the season! Scripture readings for Mass or Eucharist in Advent are often familiar and much loved.

The Old Testament readings are often from the Prophet Isaiah and are, as you may expect, prophetic. Some of these passages are well known and we realise how much was incorporated by George Frederic Handel (1685-1759) in composing his masterly oratorio "Messiah," much sung by local amateur choirs at this time. On the First Sunday (Advent Sunday), the readings look forward to the Second Coming of Christ.

On the Second Sunday, the Gospel reading tells of John the Baptist, who came to "prepare the way of the Lord"; On the Third Sunday ("Gaudete Sunday"), the Gospel reading is again about John the Baptist, the other readings about the joy associated with the coming of Christ



**JOURNEY TO BETHLEHEM** 

On the Fourth Sunday, the scene changes: the Gospel reading is about Mary and Joseph and the events leading to the birth of Jesus, and the other readings are related to these. At Christmas we usually hear from Luke and his inspiring account of the Nativity story.

"Therefore, keep awake--for you do not know when the master of

the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly.

And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake." Mark's Gospel - Words for our time of preparation




It was a joyful and thoroughly entertaining performance. Sadly only 28 people came


